A. Call to Order

- Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order with all members in attendance.

- Council then paused for a moment of personal prayer or reflection.
- Approval of Agenda

B. Deputations / Presentations / Public Meeting

Under the authority of the Municipal Act, 2001 and in accordance with Ontario's Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (MFIPPA), The Corporation of the Town of The Blue Mountains wishes to inform the public that all information including opinions, presentations, reports and documentation provided for or at a Public Meeting, Public Consultation, or other Public Process are considered part of the public record. This information may be posted on the Town's website and or/ made available to the public upon request.

B.1 Nick Brindisi, Publicity Chair, Nottawasaga Lighthouse Preservation Society Re: Nottawasaga Lighthouse Preservation Society

Nick then spoke, noting the lighthouse was first lit in 1858. Nick noted that the Nottawasaga Lighthouse Preservation Society now has over 600 members. Nick then noted the Society was continuing the work of James Kilgour to preserve the tower. Nick then reviewed the Mission and Vision of the Society to ensure the heritage resources of the lighthouse are protected and conserved.

Nick then showed views of the lighthouse, noting lightning strikes had caused significant damage and in 2004, steel straps and banding were applied to stabilize the structure and plywood and styrofoam were installed behind the plywood to prevent further deterioration.

Nick then reviewed the historical significance of the lighthouse and reviewed letters of support received to date. Nick then spoke of the Chantry Island lighthouse, a fully restored and self-sustaining tourist attraction.

Nick then requested Council authorize a letter of support to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) recognizing the lighthouse preservation initiative.

Deputy Mayor McKinlay then questioned if there was any indication that DFO had any plans for the lighthouse decommissioning, Nick replying it had been declared surplus and they did not want anyone on the island for safety reasons, adding the Society would like to take ownership as a non-profit organization and repair the structure.

Councillor McKean then questioned the cost to repair the tower to a respectable condition, Nick replying the cost is not known yet and the condition will be assessed when they are given access to the island.

Duncan then questioned how accessible the island is and would it be open to the public for access, Nick replying there were different approaches to access the island, a kayak is fine but a dock would have to be constructed similar to Chantry Island for boat access.

Councillor Gamble then questioned the construction of the tower, Nick replying it was completely limestone with wood steps inside, adding there were two courses of stone, an inner cylinder and an outer cylinder with a rubble core between.

Bob then questioned if the inner cylinder was strong, Society member, Robert Square replying yes, as far as they know.

Councillor Halos then wished the Society good luck in their efforts.

THAT Council of the Town of The Blue Mountains supports the Nottawasaga Lighthouse Preservation Society in their efforts to ensure the heritage resources of the Nottawasaga Island Lighthouse are protected by conserving the lighthouse in a manner that recognizes its significant and irreplaceable historic legacy for the people of Canada, Carried.

Mayor Anderson then questioned if M.P. Kellie Leitch was working on behalf of the Society, Nick replying he had met with Kellie and she then spoke with the Minister and the Society appears to have good communications.

Ellen then questioned the process to obtain the property for \$1.00, Robert Square then spoke regarding the process replying under the Heritage Lighthouse Protection Act. Robert noted that DFO can transfer a lighthouse to a group but that specific criteria must be followed.

Nick then noted the Society is working on their charitable status at present and introduced those members in attendance.

**B.2 Andrew Hill, Georgian Triangle Development Institute (“GTDI”)
Re: To Inform Council about the recent GTDI Economic Development Forum and to introduce a terms of reference to initiate a new regional strategy for economic development in our region**

Andrew then spoke regarding the GTDI Economic Development Forum held October 3, 2013.

Andrew then spoke regarding the key take-aways from the Conference, being we are not effectively selling the south Georgian Bay area, we are missing opportunities to attract labour, support small business and source funding and he requested support for the formation of a South Georgian Bay Regional Economic Development Corporation or Council.

Andrew then reviewed next steps in economic development, noting the GTDI wishes to help in this field and they feel as an organization they have much to offer Collingwood, Wasaga Beach, The Blue Mountains and Clearview.

Councillor Martin then questioned if the GTDI would be the lead in economic development, Andrew replying the GTDI would be a private sector supporter of the four municipalities.

Michael then noted the private sector has more expertise and the October Forum was great, with good speakers and noted that the GTDI was on the right path. Michael further noted that Andrew can provide leadership, but also will supply support to each of the four municipal economic development offices and local and regional organizations.

Councillor Ardiel then noted the Forum was great, further noting Grey and Simcoe Counties have economic development coordinators but Meaford does not. Gail noted that the Town of Meaford should be included in any initiative as a Meaford is an important part of the Georgian Triangle, Andrew replying there was no intention to exclude Meaford.

Gail then noted The Blue Mountains is open for business but it is difficult to start a new business in Collingwood as there is no economic development coordinator at present.

Andrew then noted Collingwood is very supportive of this initiative and is now considering establishing an economic development office, adding he applauds those municipalities that currently feature such offices. Andrew further noted there is more power in a collaborative effort.

Andrew then stated the proposal is a two phase approach, with the establishment of a Council in 2014 and move up to a Council or Corporation in 2015 with financing.

Councillor Halos then noted the Town has a Communications & Economic Development Coordinator and a new Economic Development Advisory Committee, further noting that the various groups should meet, adding we need to attract funding.

Andrew then noted Clearview also has an economic development committee and Council recommended he meet with the committee.

Deputy Mayor McKinlay then noted economic development is important to all and he recognizes that regional efforts are good and he would like the GTDI to work with the Town Economic Development Advisory Committee.

Councillor Gamble then spoke, noting he would reiterate Duncan and Joe's comments, adding the Town Economic Development Advisory Committee should develop a liaison with the GTDI.

**B.3 Melri Wright, Becky Harrison, Oskar Russwurm of Georgian Bay Youth Roots
Re: Beaver Crawl Triathlon**

Melri then thanked Council for the opportunity to speak on behalf of the Georgian Bay Youth Roots, a joint Meaford – The Blue Mountains organization.

Melri then noted the Beaver Crawl Triathlon was started four years ago and this year the organization was working with Georgian Bay Secondary School youth, including Becky Harrison and Oskar Russwurm and she thanked the Town for their support.

Oskar then noted the 2013 event was very successful and there have been over 140 participants in the last four years with 31 volunteers and that \$1,325 was donated last year.

Becky then noted the route for 2014 would be the same as last year, with a cost of \$45 for the first person in an adult team, \$20 for youth and \$10 for each additional team member, with all proceeds going to GBSS.

Becky then thanked Shawn Everitt and the Town for their support in the past.

Councillor Halos then questioned the date, Becky replying Canada Day, July 1.

Councillor Gamble then noted the event was a good initiative by youth for youth.

Deputy Mayor McKinlay then noted if the group requires parking in Ravenna, that they could contact him.

Councillor Ardiel then noted some Town staff are runners and they should enter the event.

Councillor Martin then thanked the deputation for attending and for their enthusiasm.

**B.4 George Matamoros, Thornbury BIA Chair and Sean Brady, Thornbury BIA Board Member
Re: Thornbury BIA Bridge Banner and Expanded Transit Link to Thornbury**

George first noted the BIA Board is working well with assistance from staff and Council. George then stated an expanded transit link to Thornbury from the resort area would benefit the community and noted the BIA supports the trial period and the BIA is hopeful that the transit will expand to Thornbury in the future.

Sean then thanked Corrina, Shawn and Rob for their assistance in BIA efforts. Sean then noted the BIA has requested clear guidance to allow the BIA to manage a bridge banner to be strung between two poles installed during reconstruction of the Highway 26 bridge over the Beaver River and for the BIA to receive any revenue from rental of the space.

Deputy Mayor McKinlay questioned if there is a proposal coming forward from staff, Troy replying staff requested support to engineer the necessary hardware to support a banner, but this was previously turned down by Council. Troy noted that Council needs to give direction as to whether or not they wish to proceed with a banner program. Troy further noted Shawn had been in discussion with engineering firms regarding the hanging of cables, and an estimated cost of approximately \$3,000 to \$8,000 was provided. The BIA has kept the idea moving, the only work completed to this point is engineering review to hold a banner between the existing poles.

Gail then noted the BIA wishes to proceed with this and it represents advertising and economic development for the area.

Councillor Martin then spoke noting this matter was previously presented to Council and Council decided not to support it.

Sean then noted the proposal is an important initiative to the BIA, further noting that the BIA will fund the implementation of the banner hardware to COLLUS standards through the use of reserves but they need approval from Council, adding the BIA also requests to receive any funds from advertising revenue.

Councillor McKean then noted if the BIA will fund the proposal, that there should be discussion between the BIA and staff on further costs, Duncan noting staff could meet with the BIA and work out a draft agreement which could be included in a report.

NOTE: Councillor Halos had earlier declared a pecuniary interest with regard to the Thornbury Business Improvement Area and did not take part in related discussion or voting.

**B.5 Peter Lush, Applicant and Rene D’Lesing Agent–Owner
Re: Easement – Application for Consent B04-2013 Town Plot Park Lot 17
Alice W/S Town of Blue Mountains**

Peter then spoke, noting the granting of the easement will not impact any future development on the retained lands and development is some time away. Peter further noted Mr. D’Lesing has owned his property for 32 years and has possessory title to the proposed easement lands and the granting of an easement would be the best way to correct a previous survey error.

Peter then noted a minor easement is a logical solution to the matter, adding moving the driveway is not logical and would make access more problematic and he would respectfully request Council to reconsider.

Rene then spoke, noting he appreciated Peter’s assistance, adding Peter sold him the property originally and building permits had been obtained for the barn and it was believed the driveway went with the property. Rene then noted he would appreciate a permanent easement to right a previous wrong.

Councillor Halos spoke with respect to the issues noted by Peter, adding Peter could sell the driveway lands to Mr. D’Lesing, Peter replying an easement is less intrusive to the balance of the property.

Councillor Martin then noted he had no objection to granting the easement.

Councillor McKean then questioned why staff originally recommended refusal of the easement, David replying because it was not necessary and that it would hinder development of the remainder of the retained vacant lands and limit access to future residential properties.

Duncan then questioned if the land could be leased for 21 years, David replying yes for 21 years less a day and that such an arrangement would not encumber the land. Duncan then noted this could be another option other than an easement, further noting the does not support the easement.

Michael then noted he feels strongly if an owner wishes to encumber his land he should be allowed to do so and Council should not interject in this.

Council then voted on the Motion, Lost.
