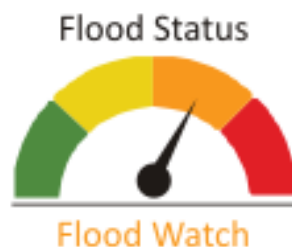
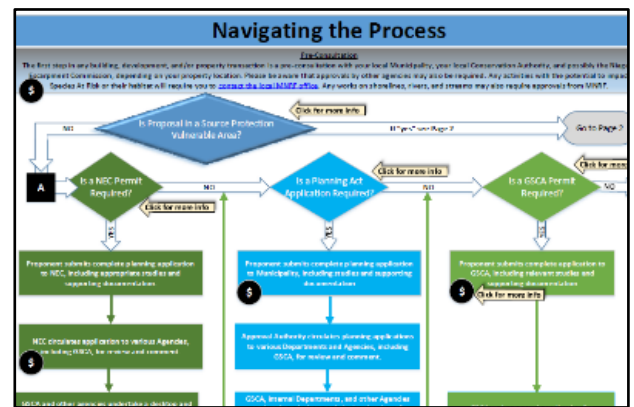


- The GSC Board of Directors endorsed a process of providing highlights shortly after meetings (such as this document). Minutes, once approved by the Board of Directors, will continue to be publicly available on the Grey Sauble Conservation (GSC) website and upon request.
- GSC adopted an accessibility policy and provided training material for Directors:
  - WHEREAS the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act requires GSC to establish policies on providing accessible customer service to people with disabilities, and to develop accessibility policies describing what we do to meet the other requirements of the regulation;
  - AND FURTHER WHEREAS staff have developed such a policy;
  - THAT the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority Board of Directors approve the Accessibility Standards Policy as provided.
- During the high water event that occurred the week of February 19th, 2018, GSC's watershed experienced significantly higher flows in several of our systems, with a total of 65 mm of rain over two days. Six out of eight of the flow gauges had flows higher than the previous maximum peak flows. Several roads were flooded but GSC had no calls from home owners about homes being flooded. Water was very close to Highway #21 in Allenford. GSC maintained contact with municipal staff as well as the media and one landowner group at the Owen Sound Mill dam. - GSC, with input from local municipalities, counties, Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, and Niagara Escarpment Commission has created an overview for landowners seeking to develop their properties. It is called Navigating the Process. The initial version will be on GSC website within the next few weeks, and GSC is hoping that other regulators, such as municipalities will wish to share it as well. It is a work in progress and will be improved over time.



- GSC will continue to utilize the MacKay Pay system for paid parking at the present time with a review of parking apps again in three to five years. The MacKay Pay system allows the public to pay for parking through a downloaded app, online or via phone. A portion of the funding goes to the company, with most being received by GSC to support conservation areas and activities.
