# **Wild Chervil**

Anthriscus sylvestris

## **History and Location**

- Invasive species. Member of the carrot/parsley family, native to Europe.
- Noxious weed, under the Ontario Weed Control Act and The Town of the Blue Mountains Long Grass and Weeds By-Law.
- Commonly found along cultivated field edges, roadsides, stream edges, and pastures.
- Abundant in various locations in the Town of the Blue Mountains and Grey County.
- When mature, out-competes native plants, and agricultural crops.
- Produces large amounts of seeds that spread easily.

#### **How to Identify**

- Wild Chervil is a biennial or short-lived perennial producing numerous compound Umbel Shaped clusters of white flowers.
- Flowers bloom usually from May to June. Seeds appear late June through July.
- Plant has alternately arranged, compound, fern-like leaves.
- Stems are entirely green, ridged, and hollow. Portions of the stem are smooth while lower portions are hairy.
- Plants are upright and can grow to 1-1.5m in height.
- Chervil resembles other plants in the carrot/parsley family, such as Wild Carrot (Queen Anne's Lace).
- Wild Chervil can be easily recognized because it is the first species in the carrot/parsley family to flower in late spring.





### **Impacts and Spread**

- Wild chervil has the ability to out-compete native plants in ditches, woodlot edges and pasturelands.
- This plant can play host to a disease, which affects carrots, celery, and parsnips.
- Human activity, wind, water, birds, and other wildlife are all factors in the spread of wild chervil seed.
- It is extremely hard to control because of its large taproot and is resistant to many herbicides.
- Wild Chervil is known to spread rapidly and aggressively along ditches, road right of ways, fence lines, and pasturelands.
- It is important to remove the entire plant as leaving some pieces behind will result in re-sprouting.
- Repeated mowing of this plant before it has gone to seed can deplete the root reserve resulting in its eventual decline.
